A belated happy New Year from Brushstrokes. After a brief break over Christmas, we hit the ground running in January and into February as we got back to the engaging and rewarding business of supporting the most vulnerable members of the West Midlands Society.

We've had some really positive activities over this last two months including the opening and blessing of our refugee house in Walsall, a hugely popular Employment Fair, some quite miraculous winter growth of greens and beans in our allotment. A full programme of events for the men and women coming to our centre to form friendships and defy winter isolation, even a fully fledged circus troupe performing to a packed hall of local kids over half term.

On a more sobering note, we have seen record numbers having to attend our foodbank already in 2024, with January seeing a massive 695 individual visits. It is these, along with the 600 individuals a month we give free advice to, who are eternally grateful for the help and support that you, our followers and supporters, tirelessly and freely give. ANDRZEJ KRAWCZYK



It is with great sadness that Brushstrokes has learnt of the sudden and untimely death of Andrzej Krawczyk. Andrzej was a volunteer at Brushstrokes from 2009 until 2015.

During that time, he was an integral part of Brushstrokes. Andrzej cared deeply about his fellow human beings, particularly those who had experienced trauma and injustice such as the people who come to Brushstrokes for help. Having been a teacher in Poland, Andrzej brought his wealth of skills and experience to teaching ESOL at Brushstrokes. He was a whizz at IT and supported other volunteer teachers to use multimedia in the classroom. Andrzej responded to need. He developed interactive teaching resources for learning new vocabulary and created and taught IT courses for people who had little or no IT skills. He helped run a weekly workclub and taught people how to use the internet to look for and apply for work. Andrzej had unlimited patience and was such a kind man. Nothing was ever too much trouble. Our thoughts and prayers are with his partner Ewa.

NICOLAS BARRÉ HOUSE

Our newly opened refugee housing project, Nicolas Barré House, received a blessing from the Archbishop of Birmingham, Bernard Langley, in January.

The project started when the parish of St. John Henry Newman decided to offer the use of an ex-presbytery house in Willenhall for the housing of local refugees in need. Brushstrokes have been working in partnership with the Parish since summer 2023 to get the house set up and ready and moved the first residents in late in December.

The blessing, which took place in January, was a celebration of our partnership's work and the event involved the residents of the house, some key team members from the parish and Brushstrokes and a group of 40 specially invited parishioners whose work and generosity had greatly helped in realising the project.

As well as the blessing from the Archbishop, there was traditional Iranian singing and music from Babak, one of the residents, the parishioners had baked a selection of English and traditional Persian cakes and the four residents planted a pear tree in the garden of the property. The whole evening was a beautiful example of a community coming together in solidarity and welcoming a new group to their parish.

Bally commented: 'the sessions are a great example of cohesion, consistency and community'. Similarly, we appreciate those who have donated football kit to us, which we've passed on to our footballers.

After we packed away the compost, seeds and gloves, RSPB Community Connector, Olivia, had this to say about our latest nature workshop: 'It was great to come and work with the Brushstrokes folks, and indeed Spectra, once again on their quest to help nature thrive in their space. With help from Bumblebee Conservation we learnt more about bumblebees and their importance (we won't have tomatoes if our bumblebees disappear!) and planted some seeds that bees and other pollinators love. Looking forward to seeing Brushstrokes buzz soon!'

EMPLOYMENT SUPPPORT PROJECT

The employment project aims to support individuals overcome their barriers and help them get into employment, education and training.

In the past two months, we have had two successful events. Firstly, a drop-in day on Wednesday 17th January when service users came to register for employment support. We had 56 registrations.

Secondly, on 21st February, we hosted a Jobs Fair in partnership with the DWP. We had a range of employers and service providers which included National Careers Service, Embark. CPC, NHS, Ilyas Community centre and Sandwell Metropolitan Council. Over 200 people attended a very successful event.

Our upcoming volunteer fair on Wednesday 13th March 2024 is a great opportunity for anyone looking to enhance their employment prospects and gain voluntary experience.

Both nurses were able to combine previous OET scores with detailed evidence of language competence from their managers and support from Brushstrokes.
