I'd like to take the opportunity to thank all those who have helped and supported Brushstrokes through their time and generosity over the past nine months helping us to respond and adapt to the challenges COVID has brought to the organisation and those we work with. From our amazing delivery drivers and resource team who have prepared and delivered over 2100 food parcels since April; to those providing advice and making over 500 welfare calls; to our innovative ESOL teachers who stepped up to develop on-line classes enabling learners to continue to develop their language skills; our funders and partner organisations who work with us to support new communities. Finally, a special thanks to those special individuals who forgetting their own needs have brought others to Brushstrokes for urgent support.

Thanks for standing with us and we wish you all the best for the New Year, hoping that we won't have to wait too long before we can meet together again.

We are really grateful to Keydi, a Primary school teacher from Honduras who so kindly offered to come in to the Brushstrokes centre one Saturday in order to decorate our reception area for Christmas. Keydi, together with her husband and daughter, has been in the UK for twelve months. The family receives ongoing resources support from Brushstrokes and she wished to express thanks by giving us the gift of her creativity. Keydi says she misses the children from her class in Honduras very much, especially four students who have special educational needs, and often sheds tears when she contacts them via Whatsapp. All the decorations were made at home by Keydi. She says, 'I love to help with colour — my heart is full of colour'. Thank you, Keydi, for sharing your colours and beauty with us this Christmas.





COVID did not stop the Brexit process and now we are nearly at the end of the transition period. What will this mean? In brief, for decades, EU citizens have had the right to live and work in the UK because of European Union law. As a consequence of the decision to leave the EU, EU citizens will no longer enjoy freedom of movement in the UK. From 1st January 2021 the UK will finally be separated from the European Union and many new rules will be introduced, including a new points-based Immigration System. Many EU Citizens are very anxious about their future lives in the UK from 1st January

and about possible returns after the Christmas holidays. That is why it is very important for them to be aware of the EU Settlement Scheme. Let me remind you about some of the key dates and facts:

- 1. EU Citizens who want to move to the UK must enter the country before 31st December 2020. If they have been here before and have simply travelled abroad for holidays they can safely come back home.
- 2. To continue to live or study in the UK, access NHS services or public funds, or travel in and out of the UK they must apply for settled or pre-settled status. The deadline for applying for this is 30th June 2021.
- 3. EU citizens must apply to the EUSS no matter how old they are! Children, parents, grant parents, brothers, sisters everybody! It is not a choice it is a legal requirement.
- 4. Pre-Settled Status (Limited Leave to Remain) is not changing automatically into Settled Status (Indefinite Leave to Remain). Remember, you do not have to wait until your Pre-Settled Status expires when you are able to prove your 5 years of residence in the UK, you can submit a new application. And... WE CAN HELP HERE!
- 5. There is NO CARD or STAMP in the passport to prove Settled or Pre-Settled Status. EU citizens can ONLY use DIGITAL PROOF which is available on the dedicated GOV.UK website called "View and prove your immigration status".

And the most important thing to remember is that Brushstrokes' EUSS TEAM is here to help! COVID did not stop Brexit, but BREXIT did not stop us! We are happy to advise and help and make sure your rights are secured. So, keep calm, enjoy the Christmas Holidays, and call us after New Year if you need any support! So we found locations here in the West Midlands like the ones in Birmingham, Walsall, and Wolverhampton. We helped with organising the logistics to transport the polling booths to all the election poll stations. On Friday afternoon, we prepared the location to be ready for opening on Saturday morning at 7 o'clock. The voting process started on Saturday 5th of November and on the 6th of November from 7am to 9pm.

My role in this election was of Vice President for the Birmingham polling station and I helped my colleague Mariana Plamadeala, who was the president of the Birmingham polling station with all the requirements that she needed in order for the process to run smoothly. Together we ensured the best service we could offer to the Romanian Community. I'm really glad that I could be involved in this type of event, and I could help my community to

have the opportunity, under the current COVID19 situation, to fulfil their constitutional right.


Ionut Matei Brushstrokes Relief EU Settled Status Advice Worker

Asylum Guides at Brushstrokes

The Asylum Guides Project is a national programme aimed at organisations working with asylum seekers, to increase legal literacy, empowering people to be able to navigate and better engage with the complex asylum system. Brushstrokes was the first organisation to work with the Refugee Action's national scaling programme to deliver Asylum Guides.

Asylum Guides are trained volunteers, matched up with asylum seekers to provide legal information about the asylum process. Over the course of a few meetings, they explain the asylum system in a way that is accessible and

easy to understand.

As the Co-ordinator for the project I oversee the recruitment, training and matching of guides with clients. We have recently recruited and trained five new Asylum Guide volunteers bringing the total number of Brushstrokes Asylum Guides to eight. They will soon begin to meet with our asylum seeker clients and begin guiding them through the asylum process, offering them information and support and empowering them to navigate their asylum journey with more confidence.

This initiative relies on the generosity of our volunteers, without which we couldn't run the project. We value their commitment and appreciate the time and effort they contribute to making a difference to those in search of a safer and better life.

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






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
