It would have taken them more than a week to cover the distance. In all this, they must have clung to the words of the angel - "Do not be afraid". Even more was to follow. We can imagine Joseph worrying and desperately trying to provide a safe space for Mary to deliver her child - "Do not be afraid". Mary delivering her baby in a stable far away from home - "Do not be afraid".

The words 'do not be afraid' are intertwined with the Christmas story. We all know how this story ends with a tiny baby being welcomed into our world, into a loving family. What joy his parents must have felt to see his beautiful face. And indeed, this baby would be a blessing to all of humanity. God always comes through in the end and he will provide; he

So, whatever you might be going through this Christmas season, do not be afraid and never give up on hope. Women's Group











In our latest women's group sessions, the ladies have been getting stuck into several craft sessions. We have found that these types of activities have really appealed to our female service users who see this as an opportunity to be creative and also chat about a range of issues. Representatives of Public Health have also attended and led conversations with the women about the importance of looking after one's mental health and how interactive sessions such as ours are a great avenue to do this. Some of our service users have really blossomed during the past weeks which has been very heartening, and they are assuming more responsibilities with the running of the sessions. In a particular session, which was festive-themed, we made greeting cards and gift bags using a range of materials provided by Brushstrokes. One of the participants commented: 'I really look forward to attending the women's group each week. It is something for me to look forward to and it really makes me happy as it makes me get out from my house. I'm really delighted to be part of the group.'









ORIENTATION

November saw us host another successful Orientation event at Brushstrokes. This session, which has been appealing to an increasing number of service users, is particularly aimed at asylum seekers who are new to the area. As an organisation we are supporting several asylum seekers in contingency hotels in West Bromwich, so it was good to see them in attendance. The fact that so many agencies and organisations are willing to participate in this session is really heartening and certainly shows how the community is coming together to support those who are new to the community. This session saw representation from Migrant Help, SERCO, the Police, Sandwell Family and Adult Learning, Code Your Future, Citizens Advice, Dorothy Parkes Community Centre to name but a few.







Nature walk at Moseley Bog with Spectra

Our walk in Moseley Bog with arts organisation, Spectra, was a wonderful wild wander, with lots of conversation about plants, trees and nature. Alongside Hayley and Joe from Spectra, Brushstrokes service users and staff discussed the names of the native trees that we passed, and looked at and touched their leaves, noticing their shape and texture. We learned about oak, hazel (and why it is coppiced), holly, beech, and birch trees. We discussed the names of the plants in different languages and what the plants were used for in each person's culture. We particularly looked closely at the impressive silver birch bark and found some interesting fungi and patterns on the trees. It was interesting to learn about moss from our Ethiopian service user, Anania, who said that in his home country, it is dried and used as incense, and it smells really good! We even found time to talk about Jo's passion for J.R.R. Tolkein's literature, which is said to have been inspired by Moseley Bog. At the end, we talked about what we had learned during our adventure in the woods. One participant said she had learned how to identify the beech tree, which she was happy about, and one said he'd learned about the different berries on the ley bush. We'd love to go back again with Spectra, perhaps in warmer spring weather, and see the woodland in bloom!



FILM EVENIN is with bountiful amounts of positive feedback about the film evenings that we've been hosting at Brushstrokes in conjunction with Black Country Touring. Touching on themes that resonate with our service users and our local community, we recently showed The Women of 10 Downing Street, about the inspirational fight for worker's rights in Smnethwick. Indian women were at the forefront of this challenge, and they certainly inspired those who were in attendance. Next up was an Iranian film, Hit the Road, about a family's journey through their homeland to Turkey. As is the case for so many families in Iran, this journey was sparked by a need to flee from Iran. Our Iranian service user, Nader, gave us an insightful view into Iranian films and the challenges that filmmakers face when tackling certain subject areas. The director of the film, Panah Panahi comes from a family of politically active filmmakers. We look forward to showing more films and casting a light on the many cultures and countries represented at Brushstrokes.





Recent sessions at Brushstrokes' men's group have been dedicated to cycle maintenance classes on Mondays 4-6pm. We're collaborating with Cycle Confident who linked us up with Gavin, a great local qualified mechanic. Gavin has been teaching us several valuable skills covering many aspects of bike maintenance. In our first session we learnt how to conduct an 'M' check which is a thorough way to diagnose any problems that a bike is suffering from. Other important skills that we have learnt include how to fix punctures, different areas of how to look after and replace chains, and different types of brakes. Members of the men's group who have previously been keenly involved in different areas of our bike project, such as our led rides and cycle classes, had expressed that learning maintenance skills was something that they wanted to develop. Their involvement and commitment has been commendable they turn up early to help set up for the sessions, collaborate brilliantly together to fix the various bikes we are fixing and always have lots of energy. The environment of these sessions is conducive for participants to chat about an array of issues and areas of their life away from men's group. The tea and coffee is always flowing and even though Gavin is only scheduled to be with us for two hours per session, we often lose sense of time as we are so engrossed in our bike fixing tasks.



CRAFT WORKSHOP DECORATION MAKING

Through the Brushspokes Bike Project, we've encountered several people who have been forced to stop cycling due to issues that can be remedied with basic knowledge of cycle maintenance - repairing a puncture, checking correct tyre pressure, brakes that need tightening etc. For those with slightly more advanced bike maintenance skills, the mechanic, Gavin, will be able to tailor the course content accordingly.
